
### **CHRIS TASIOR**

Playing around embraces humor and joy through sculpture, while suggesting a return to play as a valid coping response. Tasior's work is about creating funny little characters that help him and hopefully others work through tough feelings. Each sculpture is two-and-a-half-foot needle felted wool character positioned inside a vitrine allowing the viewer to interact in a variety of playful ways. Each vitrine acts as part of the sculpture itself creating a scene akin to comic panels. Through vibrant colors, soft texture, and fun expressive designs, each sculpture imbues one with humor and relief. The constant connectedness to all types of media creates a pressure to be aware and updated on the newest issue. This is evident in things like the hate economy and our consumption as well as expectations to be useful to harmful social structures. I use play to help release us from productivity and usefulness.

**Chris Tasior** is a sculptor born and raised in Chicago. He is inspired by his environment's history and people. His sculptures focus on the emotional experience personified in humorous characters. These sculptures are inspired by the cartoons the artist loved from childhood to adulthood. While his work is done in a variety of materials the focus is on softness in both physical and approach.
