The exhibition, through a combination of visual artworks, interactive installations, workshops, and hybrid performances, excavates how we might tap into that other 99.9965% of reality, even if only for a glimpse of its potential. Each of these immersive experiences encourages us to employ our imagination and suggests that we possess senses beyond the physical realm, which can aid us in transcending the limitations of the 0.0035%. We may find ourselves connecting with subterranean realms where crystals flourish, where tree roots and mushroom mycelia establish intricate communication networks, or even attuning ourselves to the earth's rhythmic heartbeat deep below.

The first breath that you let out after walking into *There Are Universes…* is a welcome exhalation. The kind of exhalation from a breath that you did not realize you were holding until your shoulders drop from your earlobes or your brows slowly ease down from their perch near your hairline. Faint sounds of music and water float through the space, playing over vignettes of installations and artworks. The gallery is filled with a calming and healing sensisbility as the result of someone whose practice has been strengthened and cultivated over decades of dedication.

Rhonda described first awakening to her purpose, at the age of five, as seeing secrets and wonder. Things were happening around her where words might have failed, but her perception of what was to unfold was clear. Like the joy of opening a crinkling candy wrapper, she would feel a prickling or hear a crackle that would spark a new bit of knowing. The excitement she experienced with rooting out an explanation for those inklings became a motivator. For there was much to be learned and discovered, and the universe was keen to reveal itself. She has always been a seeker of knowledge, never content with the absolute or the definitive.

The work throughout *There Are Universes...* feels like another step in her continual process of seeking. With the central premise that human beings can only perceive a mere 0.0035% of the light and energy spectrum, Rhonda offers a space for viewers to tap into the remaining continuum. While her attuned eye and mind might have caught glimpses into the other 99.9965% of what remains imperceptible to most, the rest of us are invited to flex our own muscles of intuition and intentional listening so that the enigmatic poetry of the universe can reveal itself.

Space to ground the mind and body rests in the middle. The center of the gallery is a point of convergance where soft music plays from under wooden benches that put you in perfect proximity to turf, where you are encouraged to feel the ground beneath the soles of your feet. Just like her calling to unearth the secrets that the universe presents to her, Rhonda's music practice is also one of seeking. As a self-taught pianist, she learned music by ear through the

need to quite literally "find the notes" with practice, time, and deep listening. Throughout the space she experiments with sound—remixing and blending the bubbling of streams with singing bowls, tuning forks, and other synthetic sounds.

Multiple collages and installations blend photography, tarot cards, crystals, plant cuttings, and vintage pieces like rotary telephones to create visually stunning moments throughout the exhibition. Each piece invites the observer to draw closer, tracing the delicate lines of secrets interwoven in the intricate works. Colors collide like celestial bodies, forming constellations of images that only reveal their depth to those who dare to peer beyond the surface. Rhonda constructs these collages and installations as eloquent puzzles of time and intention, where every torn fragment holds a clandestine revelation, waiting to be unveiled by the mind and heart of the seeker.

Above all, Rhonda's practice centers truth-seeking and truth-telling. In her generous sharing of her practice of seeking and finding meaning in the patterns that present themselves through dreams, visions, and clairaudience, we are called to live in radical self-acceptance of our own gifts. Like the antennae of the vintage radios on the north wall of the space, *There Are Universes...* simultaneously calls us in to witness and do our own searching for knowledges and truths that the universe has relayed. Rhonda speaks with such fluency of her intuition's silent dialogue, she creates for us a space where we might dance free from the constraints of the seen and the tangible.

Biographies

Rhonda Wheatley is a multidisciplinary artist, intuitive energy healer, and wellness workshop facilitator. Throughout the past nine years she has integrated healing-focused events into her art practice, which is grounded in the speculative, the metaphysical, and the spiritual. Her ultimate aims are to connect with people in deeply meaningful ways to help them achieve personal breakthroughs, cultivate radical self-acceptance, and to live more authentically, as she learns to do the same.

Wheatley has had recent solo shows at Glass Curtain Gallery and Hyde Park Art Center in Chicago and Aurora Public Art in Aurora. Recent group shows include the Museum of Contemporary Art in Chicago, the Art League of Houston, and the Lubeznik Center for the Arts in Michigan City, IN. Wheatley has facilitated workshops across the Chicagoland area with Threewalls, where she's a Culture of Care Collaborator; 6018North, 3Arts, ACRE, Heaven Gallery, Chicago Artists Coalition, University of Chicago, Gallery 400, Lake Forest College, Urban Rivers, and more. Beyond Illinois, she has facilitated an international workshop with Creative Capital, retreat workshops at Indiana University, and online events with Buffalo AKG Art Museum, the Ox-Bow School of Art, and Artists at Work. Wheatley earned a BA from Loyola University and an MA from DePaul University and was a 2020 Loghaven Fellow, a 2023 Jackman Goldwasser Radicle Resident at Hyde Park Art Center, where she's taught for ten years, and was a recipient of CAC's Maker Grant. She is a certified energy healer of more than 13 years and practices several healing modalities.

Adia Sykes is a Chicago-based independent curator and arts administrator. Her current research examines the potential of curating as an advocacy tool for racial equity in the arts. Through her practice, she seeks to center philosophies of improvisation and intuition, engaging them as tools by which meaningful relationships between artists and viewers can be cultivated, while leaving space for the vernacular to mingle with constructs of history and theory. Her recent curatorial projects include Locating Memory in the Chicago Mayor's Office, Project Radio London at Centro Arte Opificio Siri in Terni, Italy, and The Petty Biennial.2 in Chicago. She has also realized projects with the Art Institute of Chicago, Sullivan Galleries, Woman Made Gallery, Material Exhibitions, Roman Susan Gallery, and Comfort Station.

Sykes earned a Masters of Arts from the Department of Arts Administration and Policy from the School of the Art Institute of Chicago in 2018 and a BA in Anthropology from the University of Chicago in 2016 with a focus on material culture and museums.
